TO NOTTINGHAM & EAST MIDLANDS SCHOOL OF ANAESTHESIA**

APPOINTMENT

Whole-time, Specialist Registrar in Anaesthetics to the Nottingham and East Midlands Rotational Training Scheme, administered by Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust. The rotation involves Queen's Medical Centre, Nottingham City Hospital, Kings Mill Hospital Mansfield, Derby Group of Hospitals and Lincoln County Hospital.

These are 5 year training programmes approved by the Royal College of Anaesthetists (RCA) for specialist registrar training in anaesthesia, and designed to meet the requirements of the RCA as described in their manual *The CCST in Anaesthesia*. The Postgraduate Dean has confirmed that this post has the required educational approval. Applicants should be aware that the standard SpR rotations do NOT provide sufficient training on its own for Intermediate Training in Intensive Care Medicine.

The Northern rotation currently rotates at 20 week intervals to include all of the hospitals over the 5 year period. Opportunities for Off-Rotation training in research or specialized areas of practice are available though opportunities may reduce following MMC.

Specialist Registrars (SpRs) are expected to play an active part in undergraduate and postgraduate education programmes.

Possession of Primary FRCA or equivalent is essential, as is possession of a Certificate of Completion of SHO Training or equivalent documentation by the date of the interview.

The appointment is for one year in the first instance, renewable for a further four years, subject to satisfactory progress.

NOTTINGHAM HOSPITALS

The two major hospitals in Nottingham merged into a single Trust in April 2006 to create one of the largest acute hospitals in Europe. The Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust comprises the QMC campus and the City Hospital Campus, serving an immediate population of approximately 620,000.

Queen's Medical Centre Campus, Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust

The campus is a major site with over 1,300 beds. It is the major Accident and Emergency centre for Nottingham and the surrounding area. The hospital has extensive out-patient facilities and the most modern equipment and accommodation. Commissioning started in 1978 and it was completed in 1985.

The hospital has one of the largest surgical caseloads in the country, with over 30 operating theatres and 52 consultants including a Professor and Senior Lecturer providing training in anaesthesia, Adult Intensive Care Medicine and Pain Management. A wide variety of surgery is performed and there is a 14 bed Adult Intensive Care Unit caring for surgical, neurosurgical, trauma and medical patients and separate general surgical HDUs (8 bed) and

medical HDUs. There is a busy spinal unit with an international reputation, and its own 8 bed HDU. A new Eye/ENT wing opened in December 2000, with a 7 theatre operating suite. The obstetric unit includes a Professorial Feto-Maternal Medicine Department and has approx 3000 deliveries per annum including a number of high-risk pregnancies.

There is a purpose built Postgraduate Education Centre, which has been extended and refurbished to include the Trent Simulation and Skills Centre opened in Spring 2004, including high-fidelity patient simulation based on the METI simulator. The current Skill and Simulator Centre Centre Director is a consultant anaesthetist (Dr Baxendale) supported by admin and technical support and a clinical teaching/research fellow.

The hospital is adjacent to the University of Nottingham campus and has all the University facilities. The Queen's Medical Centre houses the Medical Science Department of the Medical School and the Greenfield Medical Library, which is one of 4 main libraries. The current bed complement is:

When current developments are completed, it will have over 1,400 beds. All these are located on one 85-acre campus with out-patient facilities and all support services. The hospital employs 4,500 staff, deals with 55,000 in-patients per annum including day patients and over 180,000 out-patients per year.

There is a large capital development programme in progress, which will significantly improve the range of services provided. This includes a new GU Medicine Department opened in 1990, the new Radiology Department which came into service during 1991, a new Renal and Oncology Department opened in October 1993, and a new Maternity and Neonatal Unit which includes a Patient Hotel. A purpose built Day Case Surgery building opened in 1994. A new Breast Unit opened in 2003 and current building projects include new Urology and Cardiac Units.

A 10 bedded High Dependency Unit was opened in July 2002.

A full range of medical services is provided at the hospital, which is a Regional or sub-Regional specialist centre for several disciplines - these include Antenatal Diagnosis and Clinical Cytogenetics, Thoracic Surgery, Renal Dialysis and Transplant Surgery, Plastic Surgery and Burns, and Neonatal Medicine and Surgery.

There are very close links with the University Medical School. The hospital plays a full and active part in both undergraduate and postgraduate teaching and there are Chairs based on the City Hospital campus in Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Surgery, Clinical Genetics, Respiratory Medicine, Oncology, Infectious Diseases and Stroke Medicine. There are also Senior Lecturers in Anaesthesia, Haematology, Palliative Medicine and Rheumatology based on the campus.

The hospital has been designated a HISS (Hospital Information and Support Service) pilot site. The comprehensive resource management system involves terminals in every ward, bay and office and allows computerised ordering of Pathology, Radiology and other services.

The Postgraduate Education Centre was opened in 1972 and has recently been extended. It provides facilities for seminars, tutorials and research. There is a large well-equipped lecture theatre which seats approximately 150. A Multi Disciplinary Clinical Skills Laboratory opened in 2004. An extensive Postgraduate Education programme is available in Nottingham and a leaflet giving details of the current term's activities is available from the Postgraduate Centre office.

The library is located in the Centre and contains an extensive selection of journals and books. It has access to the medical section of the University Library, National Lending and other libraries in the country, thus providing an extensive range of literature. There is access to CD ROM offering a Medline service.

THE WORK OF THE DIRECTORATES

The directorates of anaesthesia provide services for routine and emergency surgery in all the Nottingham hospitals, cover for Intensive Care Units and Pain Management Programmes, including an Acute Pain Service on both sites.

The establishment has been increased by a part-time ICU secretary.

The University Department of Anaesthesia, headed by Professor A R Aitkenhead, maintains close links with the Clinical Directorates and encourages active programmes of teaching and research. The University Department has a large number of research projects in progress

and is keen to support new ideas of clinical or laboratory based research among all members of staff in SpR and Consultant grades.

A wide range of laboratory equipment is available and there are facilities for statistical advice and analysis within the University Department and through direct links to the University mainframe computer. Advice and practical help are always available in connection with production of research protocols and preparation of manuscripts for publication in scientific journals.

As well as training Anaesthetists the Department of Anaesthesia teaches undergraduates, ODAs, ambulance personnel, nurses, visiting paramedical staff and postgraduates.

Regular audit, clinical and tutorial meetings, journal clubs and courses for both of the FRCA examinations are arranged, to which the successful candidate would be expected to contribute.

DUTIES OF THE POST

Clinical

To perform such duties as are necessary to the provision of Anaesthetic services to the Nottingham Hospitals. To provide first call emergency cover to the Obstetrics Units and Intensive Care Units and second and third call cover to the Senior House Officers as set out on the weekly published rota.

Teaching

In the first two years there is no formal teaching commitment other than presentation of material in seminar groups. In the final three years there are courses for all the parts of the FRCA organised by the Department of Anaesthetics and the SpRs take part in these courses and also assist in the organisation of the tutorial programmes, journal club and morbidity meetings which take place once a week.

There is also involvement in undergraduate teaching.

Research

Specialist Registrars are encouraged to concentrate on obtaining the appropriate postgraduate qualifications but where these have been obtained then they are encouraged to participate in any current research projects and facilities can be arranged for an individual to pursue his or her own lines of enquiry with appropriate advice. During years 3 to 5 SpRs are encouraged to participate in research projects during their time spent in the clinical modules for which 2 sessions are available each week.

There is also a module during which a SpR is attached to the Academic Department. Each SpR has the opportunity to apply for this module.

Administration

Specialist Registrars are asked to elect one of their numbers to be their regular representative on the Directorates. During years 3-5 the SpRs are expected to attend Clinical Directorate meetings. At both the University and City Hospitals, a SpR is nominated to have administrative duties involving the day-to-day running of the department, i.e. responsibility for junior doctors and arranging the duty rota.

Year 3-5 SpRs are expected to attend the Trent Regional Management Course.

STUDY AND TRAINING

The Trent Regional Guidelines on study leave are the basis for the provision of study leave for hospital doctors who work in the hospitals of the Nottingham Health Authority and a copy of these guidelines may be obtained from the College Tutors or the Postgraduate Dean's Office. Study Leave for courses outside the Region will only be approved if there is no Regional course or if there are special circumstances.

In Nottingham the SpR Training Scheme is structured so that blocks of 5 or 10 months are spent in each site on the rotation. More than one module may be taken simultaneously. The scheme is such that trainees work for almost equal periods in the University Hospital and the City Hospital.

Library Facilities

There is a comprehensive medical reference library in the University of Nottingham Medical School to which all members of the hospital medical staff have free access and borrowing rights.

The PGMEC itself provides facilities for courses and meetings, including a full range of life support courses.

The Postgraduate Medical Educational Centre at Nottingham City Hospital was opened in 1972. The library, which was modernised and extended in 1981, is located in the Centre and contains an extensive section of the University library, national lending and other libraries in the country, thus providing an extensive range of literature.

Each hospital department has a local library in addition. Several also have IT facilities on site for use by the anaesthetic trainees.

Sutton-in-Ashfield/MANSFIELD

King's Mill Hospital, Sherwood Forest NHS Trust

Acute services are provided at King's Mill Hospital, Sutton-in-Ashfield. This is situated on the outskirts of Mansfield on the A38 and is the new District General Hospital for the Mansfield and Ashfield areas of central Nottinghamshire. It is currently undergoing a major rebuilding program.

DUTIES OF THE POST

a) 1st/2nd Year

Clinical

In-patient: Pre-operative assessment and post-operative care of patients. Duties within the Intensive Care and Obstetric Units.

Theatre Duties As defined in Anaesthetic rota, with appropriate supervision.

Out-Patient: Anaesthetic care of patients in the Accident and Emergency Department and some Day Case lists.

Teaching Supervision and instruction of junior colleagues as indicated from time to time. Participation in audit meetings and departmental tutorials.

Research Research is encouraged and opportunities are available to pursue this.

Administration General administrative duties within the department including organisation of the on-call rota.

On-call/Emergency The post involves 40 standard hours.

b) 3rd/4th/5th Year

As a prospective Consultant, the 3rd/5th Year SpR's are closely involved in the organisation of the department's service and teaching commitments, working in close liaison with the College Tutor and the Associate Clinical Director. In this context, attendance at the regular Divisional meetings is encouraged and the opportunity may be afforded to participate in Appointment Committees.

The department holds regular, weekly tutorial sessions on Wednesday mornings, organised by the College Tutor, at which the contributions of the SpRs have always been valued.

Participation in research is encouraged and 1 session per week may be allocated to this purpose.

A regular commitment in order to pursue a particular interest may be possible by mutual agreement.

Senior trainees are encouraged to take part in a "Management Week" with the Medical Director, Dr Mike Mowbray.

STUDY AND TRAINING

Study leave may be granted to attend the Final FRCA course at Nottingham and attendance at the weekly Anaesthetic meeting there is encouraged. The College Tutor in Mansfield holds weekly tutorial meetings on Wednesday mornings, trainee Anaesthetists are rostered to attend. Regular audit meetings are also held.

The Trent Regional Guidelines on study leave are the basis for the provision of study leave for hospital doctors who have contracts with Nottingham Health Authority and a copy of these guidelines may be obtained from the College Tutors or the Postgraduate Dean's Office.

Library Facilities

There is a well stocked Medical Library at King's Mill Hospital under the direction of a full-time librarian.

There is also a small departmental library and an expanding collection of archived teaching material available on the computers in the tutorial room and registrars' office. Internet access is available from these computers.

As well as training Anaesthetists the Department of Anaesthesia teaches undergraduates, ODPs, ambulance personnel and nurses.

SOUTHERN DERBYSHIRE

THE HOSPITALS

The city has two main hospitals, with General Hospital status (Derbyshire Royal Infirmary NHS Trust and Derby City General Hospital NHS Trust). A new Children's Hospital opened in 1996 on the Derby City General Hospital site.

Between them they offer experience in Anaesthesia for a wide variety of Surgical specialties, including:

General, Urological, Vascular, Orthopaedic, Hand, ENT, Dental and Maxillo-facial, Ophthalmic, Gynaecological and Obstetric, plus Radiotherapy, ECT, Radiological procedures, Pain Relief and involvement in two Intensive Therapy Units, a Paediatric High Dependency Unit and a Special Care Baby Unit.

There is also an occasional need for Anaesthesia in other areas, e.g. in the Accident and Emergency Department and on the wards, e.g. for Cardioversion.

Derbyshire Royal Infirmary NHS Trust

This is the acute hospital for the Southern Derbyshire Health District. Situated here are the major Accident and Emergency Unit, main out-patient facilities and the Hand Surgery Unit. In addition, the hospital provides Radiotherapy services for the Derby area.

The central block contains the Accident and Emergency Department, a four-theatre suite for Orthopaedic Surgery and ENT Surgery (also covering Oral and Radiotherapy work), the Hand Surgery Unit with its own theatres, the Orthopaedic and Fracture Clinic, X-ray Department; a 9-bedded Intensive Care Unit and 8-bedded Coronary Care Unit are also in this block.

Elsewhere in the hospital there is a new twin theatre for Ophthalmic Surgery, and a twin theatre suite for General Surgery.

New Departments of Rheumatology and Rehabilitation and ENT and Audiology have been built and facilities for Pathology have been extended and upgraded.

There is a Department of Cardiothoracic Measurement and Pulmonary Function Testing.

A new Postgraduate Education Centre with library was completed in 1995.

A Pain Management Unit is situated in its own suite at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary, which is run by two Consultant Anaesthetists - Dr P H Bavister and Dr A E Searle - with nursing and clerical support.

The latest redevelopment of the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary was opened in 1997 and includes additional wards and theatres for orthopaedic surgery.

Derby City General Hospital NHS Trust

Together with the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary this hospital provides the Acute Medical facilities for Southern Derbyshire Health Authority.

It provides specialist care in General Medicine, General and Urological Surgery and Obstetrics and Gynaecology. There is a Coronary Care Unit (6 monitored beds) and a 6-bedded Intensive Care Unit, a Renal Dialysis Unit and an Oncology Research Laboratory.

There are no Casualty services at the Derby City General Hospital but Acute Surgical take alternates with the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary.

The redevelopment of the Derby City General Hospital in six phases is underway. Phase 1 was opened in April 1987 and provides beds for Gynaecology and Maternity, a Special Care Baby Unit and four operating theatres. There is a Central Delivery Suite with a 24-hour epidural service providing some 2,000 epidurals per annum. The Unit has its own designated anaesthetist throughout the 24 hours and its own operating theatre.

The Day Case Surgery Unit provides facilities for Day Case Gynaecological and General Surgery.

There is a new Psychiatric Unit on this site which provides for the treatment of acute mental illness and will include a Mother and Baby Unit.

Derbyshire Children's Hospital

This hospital has opened in September 1996 as part of the Derby City General Hospital. The services provided cover a large field of Paediatrics, including General, Neonatal, Orthopaedics, Ophthalmic and ENT from an area of approximately half a million population. There is one operating theatre. Children's accident cases are dealt with by the main A&E unit at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and transferred to the Children's Hospital if admission is necessary. There are 4 high dependency cots.

THE WORK OF THE DEPARTMENT

The Anaesthetic service is co-ordinated to provide a service to all Derby hospitals, being the largest single clinical department. Full operating lists take place at all hospitals within the group. Emergencies are admitted to the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and the Derby City General Hospital and those for the appropriate specialty and age group to the Children's Hospital. Obstetrics are dealt with at the Derby City General Hospital Maternity Unit and an epidural service is provided here.

Apart from Anaesthetic cover for the Surgical specialties the department has an involvement in the work of the Accident and Emergency Department and Fracture Clinic, ECT, X-ray, Intensive Care for Babies at the Children's Hospital and the Special Care Baby Unit at the Derby City General Hospital. There is a Pain Management Unit at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Intensive Care Units at both the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Derby City General Hospital.

Weekly tutorials are held at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Derby City General Hospital, organised by the College Tutor. These include presentations by members of staff, morbidity conferences, journal clubs and occasional presentations by pharmaceutical companies (videos, slides, etc.).

All staff are honorary members of the Derby Medical Society and the Sheffield and East Midlands Society of Anaesthetists. Staff are also eligible to attend meetings held in the

Postgraduate Teaching Centre at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Derby City General Hospital for other specialties and Anaesthetic meetings held on a regular basis in Nottingham, Leicester and Sheffield, details of which are published in advance.

There is a full-time Departmental Office Manager and 2 part-time Secretaries based at the DRI.

There is an Anaesthetics Secretary, based at the Derby City General Hospital.

DUTIES OF THE POST

Clinical

All trainee Anaesthetic staff are expected to visit their patients before operation and to arrange and supervise, when necessary, post-operative treatment, including pain relief.

They will have a regular commitment to routine Surgical operating lists under Consultant supervision, in accordance with the recommendations of the Royal College of Anaesthetists on junior staff training, for practical and theoretical tuition.

There is a planned rotation between the two hospitals in the city to give experience in all the above mentioned specialties, thus there will be some degree of involvement in the ITUs and the Obstetric Epidural service. The Anaesthetics Department publishes a rota at two-weekly intervals indicating the distribution of trainee staff for teaching and other purposes.

Teaching

Trainee staff are expected to give practical tuition to Operating Department Assistants etc., during operating lists and to assist in the training of junior grades.

Administration

All trainee staff are expected to attend the whole-day departmental meetings held at monthly intervals (excluding May and August), which comprise a Business Meeting, CEPOD meeting, and a session devoted to Medical Audit and Education - at which attendance is compulsory.

A 'Division of Anaesthetic Trainees (DAT)' also exists, with an elected spokesperson. Planning and organising the duty rota for the department.

Research

Specialist Registrars are encouraged to concentrate on obtaining the appropriate postgraduate qualifications but where these have been obtained, or there is a delay before an individual is eligible, then they are encouraged to participate in any current research projects and facilities can be arranged for an individual to pursue his/her own lines of enquiry with appropriate advice.

STUDY AND TRAINING

Weekly tutorials are held at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Derby City General Hospital, organised by the College Tutor. These include presentations by Consultants/juniors on allocated topics, morbidity conferences, journal clubs and occasional presentations by pharmaceutical companies (videos, slides etc).

Staff are also eligible to attend meetings held in the Postgraduate Teaching Centres at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and Derby City General Hospital for other specialties and Anaesthetic meetings held on a regular basis in Nottingham, Leicester and Sheffield, details of which are published in advance.

Specialist Registrars are expected to attend an appropriate Final FRCA course and to take their full quota of study leave.

Library Facilities

The main library is situated at the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary, with a full-time librarian. There is a library at the Derby City General Hospital, with a part-time librarian. The two libraries are complementary.

Postgraduate Medical Education Service

There are Postgraduate Medical Centres at both the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary and the Derby City General Hospital, which provides all the facilities.

NORTH LINCOLNSHIRE

Lincoln is a pleasant cathedral city with a population of 77,000. It is the main hospital centre for North Lincolnshire which has a total population of 265,700. Other urban centres include Louth (population 12,400) and Gainsborough (population 18,900).

LINCOLN AND LOUTH NHS TRUST

Lincoln County Hospital

This hospital is situated near the city centre. It is a newly developed large and modern complex which caters for most of the major specialities and has 850 beds, with plans for substantial expansion in the near future.

There are 253 General Medical and Care of the Elderly beds including Coronary Care, Rheumatology, Haematology and Thoracic. There are at present 108 General Surgical beds (including Urology and Vascular Surgery), 13 ENT beds, 4 Oral Maxillo Surgery beds and 10 Ophthalmology beds. There are currently two 28-bedded and one 14-bedded Orthopaedic wards, with a modern outpatient suite including a plaster room. The theatre complex comprises 10 theatres with 3 dedicated to Orthopaedic Surgery (2 with laminar flow). There is an Ophthalmic Unit, an Adult Day Care Unit and a 3-Consultant ENT Department.

The Intensive Care Unit presently has 8 beds. Over 300 patients are admitted to the Unit every year for a full range of support including haemofiltration. Five consultants have designated ICU sessions. There is a separate consultant on-call rota.

The Accident & Emergency Department is the main A&E centre for the area, and sees 33,000 new patients a year. The Department, which is led by two Consultants, also provides Flying Squad services.

The Maternity Service is housed in a separate wing. It has 35 ante and postnatal beds, 10 delivery beds and 24 Special Care infant cots. There are over 3,000 deliveries per annum. Anaesthetic provision includes an on-request epidural service for pain relief in labour and assistance with the high dependency care of sick obstetric patients. Operative deliveries are carried out mainly under regional anaesthesia in the dedicated obstetric theatre on the Labour Ward. The Maternity Wing also houses the gynaecological wards with 34 beds and two operating theatres, plus an 8-bedded day case unit.

The Anaesthetic Department runs an active Chronic Pain Relief Clinic. There is an Acute Pain Service with 5 consultant sessions and a nurse practitioner.

The large X-ray Department is situated close to the Out-patient and Accident and Emergency Departments and has sophisticated X-ray facilities including CT and MRI scanning.

The Pathology Directorate provides a first class service in Biochemistry, Haematology, Histopathology and Public Health. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides prompt and accurate reports with excellent supervision from two Consultants.

Other hospitals in the Trust are St George's Hospital, Louth County Hospital and John Coupland Hospital in Gainsborough. TRAINEES WILL NOT BE EXPECTED TO WORK IN THESE HOSPITALS.

DUTIES OF THE POST

Work will be under the supervision of Consultant Anaesthetists at the County Hospital, Lincoln, assisting with General Surgery, Urology, Vascular Surgery, Orthopaedics, ENT, Gynaecology, Ophthalmology, Oral and Maxillo-facial Surgery, Obstetrics and the Pain Service.

The SpR will have duties on the Intensive Care Unit.

The SpR will have some responsibility for the supervision and tuition of more junior colleagues, along with the College Tutor and other Consultants. In the 3rd/4th/5th Year rotation the appointee will help administer the duties and tuition of trainee anaesthetists.

Duty Rota and On-Call

The SpR will be second on-call for emergencies covering the SHOs but first on-call for Intensive Care. There will be some separate obstetric on-call. In the 4th year there may be opportunity to take a supervisory 'third on call' role. The on-call rota is based on a 24 hour partial shift.

Study and Training

Trainee anaesthetists working for higher qualifications are allowed to attend appropriate courses in the Region and occasionally elsewhere.

The Postgraduate Medical Education Centre is situated at the County Hospital, Lincoln; there is an excellent Medical Library which serves all medical personnel in Lincolnshire. A fully qualified librarian is in charge and there are borrowing facilities with the British Library and two subscription libraries.

There is a regular Monday afternoon teaching session.

There are extensive computing facilities both in the library and in the Anaesthetic Department. The Department has four computers designated for trainee use. They are appropriately equipped with DVD ROM drives, scanners, colour and laser printers. We also possess an SVGA projector which connects directly to a PC/MAC and allows high quality projection direct from the computer. The department has a high-speed internet link. There are 25 major texts on CD ROM and also an MCQ bank and a 'Bench book' library in the department.

There are two secretaries in the Department and one in ICU, providing full secretarial assistance.

Research is encouraged, provided there is no conflict with studies for appropriate higher qualifications. Supervision and facilities for developing projects are provided within the department.

LEICESTERSHIRE

Glenfield Hospital NHS Trust

This one of three major teaching hospitals serving Leicestershire opened in 1984. It has gradually expanded and currently contains over 400 beds together with 8 operating theatres and a General Intensive Care Unit, Cardiac ITU and Paediatric ITU. The Regional Cardiology and Cardiothoracic Surgery Services are now at Glenfield Hospital.

DUTIES OF THE POST

Clinical

Glenfield Hospital is the centre for Cardiothoracic Surgery for the southern half of the Trent Region and provides experience in all forms of Thoracic and Cardiac Surgery, excluding transplantation. Over 1500 open heart operations were carried out in the last year, 10% of the workload is in Paediatric Cardiothoracic Surgery. Anaesthetics are also given for cardiac catheterisation and for pacemaker implantations. In the perioperative setting Transoesophageal Echocardiography is used routinely in the majority of cardiac cases. In the thoracic theatre, major thoracic procedures like pleuropneumonectomy and lung volume reduction surgery are performed on a regular basis.

Teaching

In addition to informal teaching in theatre and the Intensive Care Unit, there are organised Tuesday afternoon teaching sessions including multi-disciplinary audit. A combined cardiac anaesthetic and cardiac surgical audit meeting is held monthly on a Tuesday morning.

Research

2 sessions per week will be set aside for study/research.

STUDY AND TRAINING

There is a Postgraduate Medical Centre situated at the Leicester Royal Infirmary, which has a large lecture theatre, a seminar room, laboratory and a museum. Lectures on all topics are held regularly. This Centre is actively concerned in the Vocational Training of General Practitioners in the area. There is a weekly postgraduate clinical presentation or lecture on Thursdays at the Postgraduate Medical Education Centre.

The Medical School Library is included in the Clinical Sciences Building at the Leicester Royal Infirmary and the Librarian is able to obtain, on loan, books and journals not available in the library. A similar library with reference books and periodicals is situated at the Leicester General Hospital.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Postgraduate Training

Trent Region is committed to developing postgraduate training programmes for both general and higher professional training as laid down by Colleges and Faculties, and by the Postgraduate Deans' network. At local level, college/specialty tutors work with Unit Postgraduate Clinical Tutors in supervising these programmes. Trainees will be expected to take part in these programmes (including audit) and to attend counselling sessions/professional review. Study leave will form part of these educational programmes and will be arranged in conjunction with the appropriate tutor.

Conditions of Service

The appointment is subject to the new Terms and Conditions of Service for the Specialist Registrar grade and also such other policies and procedures as may be agreed from time to time.

The successful candidate will be contracted by the individual Trusts at which he/she will work. As a consequence he/she is expected to be aware of local policies and procedures and take note of the standing orders and financial instructions of the appropriate Trust.

Salary

The SpR salary scale rises by 8 annual increments, in accordance with the current nationally agreed salary scale.

Health Clearance and Medical Examination

This appointment is subject to medical fitness and the appointee may be required to undergo a medical examination and chest X-ray.

Potential applicants should be aware of the Department of Health and GMC/GDC requirements with regard to HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis viruses.

Candidates are advised that they will be asked at interview whether they are aware of anything preventing them from fulfilling their professional commitment and this includes health.

Residence

Nottingham

Queen's Medical Centre: This is currently a resident post for years 1/2. The senior SpR acting as 3rd on-call at QMC is usually resident

Nottingham City Hospital: This is currently a residential post for years 1/2. At present yr 3/4/5 remain non-resident posts.

Lincoln

You will be expected to be resident at the hospital when on-call and single accommodation is available, but it is likely that there will be married accommodation available at the hospital.

Derby

You will be expected to be resident at the hospital when on-call and single accommodation is available, but it is likely that there will be married accommodation available at the hospital.

Mansfield

You will be expected to be present at the hospital when on-call and single accommodation is available, but it is likely that there will be married accommodation available at the hospital.

Leicester

During the Leicester modules, the SpR should be present in the hospital, when undertaking 'on-call' emergency duty, and appropriate accommodation will be provided.

Removal Expenses

Hospitals in the Trent Region now operate their own policy for the reimbursement of relocation expenses.

You should not commit yourself to any expenditure in connection with relocation before first obtaining advice and approval from the Medical Staffing Department at either your lead unit or initial base unit, otherwise you may incur costs, which you will be unable to reclaim.

Study Leave

This is granted in accordance with the recommended allowance subject to the maintenance of the service and to prior formal approval by the Medical Personnel Department concerned.

Annual Leave

Specialist Registrars shall be entitled to annual leave at the rate of five weeks a year and the leave year shall run from 1 November to 31 October each year. Practitioners joining the scheme part-way through the year shall be entitled to leave pro-rata.

Notification of Termination of Employment

Specialist Registrars are required to give a minimum of three months' notice of termination of their employment. Only in exceptional circumstances will less than three months' be allowed.

Health and Safety

Each Trust recognises its duties under the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 to ensure, as far as it is reasonably practical, the Health, Safety and Welfare at work of all its employees and in addition the business of the Trust shall be conducted so as to ensure that patients, their relatives, contractors, voluntary workers, visitors and members of the public having access to Authority premises and the facilities are not exposed to risk to their health and safety.

All Medical and Dental staff under contract will be expected to comply with all appropriate Trust Health and Safety policies.

Arrangements will be made for the successful candidate to receive copies of the Health and Safety policies.

VISITING

Official visiting is not encouraged prior to shortlisting, after which official visiting will be restricted to shortlisted applicants only, who are encouraged to visit the hospitals involved in the rotation, if they wish to do so.
